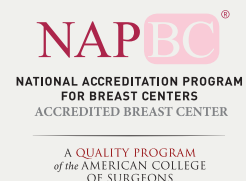

The **Stanford Medicine Cancer Center** is part of the Stanford Cancer Institute, an **NCI-Designated Comprehensive Cancer Center**.



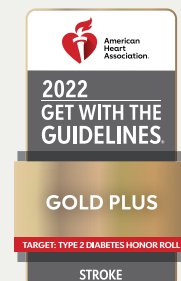
